- ✓ Athletes, inventors, and entrepreneurs who succeed do so through deliberate practice, emotional sobriety, and calculated strategy.
- ✓ Trade the erratic rollercoaster of passion for the unyielding momentum of purpose, dedication, and disciplined execution.
