1 The Narrative Fallacy in Success

- ✓ Nassim Nicholas Taleb coined the 'narrative fallacy' to describe our compulsion to invent neat, heroic stories over chaotic, luck-filled events.
- ✓ When we succeed, ego rewrites history, pretending we foresaw every turn, planned every victory, and possessed an innate destiny for greatness.
- ✓ This self-mythologizing blinds us to the immense roles played by timing, market conditions, collective team effort, and sheer luck.

2 Steve Jobs and the Myth of Infallibility

- ✓ Steve Jobs's legendary 'reality distortion field' was celebrated, but early in his career, his arrogance got him fired from Apple.
- ✓ Holiday notes that myth becomes myth not in the living but in the retelling; the real Jobs succeeded only after learning painful humility at NeXT and Pixar.
- ✓ Believing your own propaganda makes you reckless, prompting foolish risks on the assumption that you are blessed by providence.

3 Living by Facts, Not Legends

- ✓ Discard the narrative of the solitary genius hero; anchor yourself in cold, empirical data and observable operational realities.
- ✓ Track the true causal chain of events honestly: credit the mentors, the lucky breaks, and the team members who made success possible.
- ✓ Focus on what needs to be done today rather than writing the triumphant chapter of your future autobiography.
