- ✓ Marcus Aurelius asked: 'Does the emerald lose its beauty if no one speaks of it?' True quality is self-evident and self-contained.
- ✓ Hold yourself to an uncompromising internal standard; if you met your standard, the failure of the market to appreciate it cannot touch you.
- ✓ Find peace in knowing you gave everything you had to the task; the effort is enough, and the work was worth it.
