- ✓ If you are known as the world's preeminent deep-sea diver, anyone finding an undersea sunken treasure will seek you out exclusively.
- ✓ Build a distinct personal brand anchored in unassailable integrity and rare competence; fortune will become deterministic rather than stochastic.

3 Extreme Patience and the Power of Multi-Year Horizons

- ✓ Impatience with actions, patience with results: sprint aggressively on daily execution, but allow compounding decades to manifest financial outcomes.
- ✓ Most people overestimate what they can accomplish in twelve months, but drastically underestimate what compounds across a ten-year horizon.
- ✓ Naval's angel investing thesis illustrates that top startup investments took 7 to 10 years to mature; premature panic liquidates fortunes.
