1 Shattering the 4-Billion-Year Law: Intelligent Design

- ✓ For four billion years, every living organism on Earth evolved under the relentless rules of natural selection, constrained by organic chemistry and reproductive biology.
- ✓ In the 21st century, *Homo sapiens* is shattering this cosmic law, replacing natural selection with conscious **intelligent design**.
- ✓ Genetic engineers can now splice jellyfish genes into mice to make them glow fluorescent green in the dark, inaugurating an era where biology is editable software.

2 The Three Pathways to Post-Humanity

- ✓ Humanity is engineering its successors through three distinct technological pathways: **Biological Engineering**, **Cyborg Engineering**, and **Inorganic Life**.
- ✓ Biological engineering rewrites DNA code; cyborg engineering integrates organic brains with bionic limbs; and inorganic life builds autonomous artificial intelligence systems.
- ✓ Bionic arms connected directly to human nerve fibers allow paralyzed patients to grasp objects and feel sensory touch purely through thought, blurring human-machine boundaries.

3 The Biological Caste Divide: Speciation of Inequality

- ✓ In the past, the rich and poor were separated by legal myths, but they remained biologically identical; a poor peasant had the same brain and physical durability as a wealthy aristocrat.
- ✓ In the 21st century, advanced biotechnology and cognitive enhancements may allow affluent elites to upgrade their own children's intelligence, lifespan, and physical health.
- ✓ If life-extension and cognitive enhancements become expensive commercial products, human society will split into biologically distinct species—an enhanced ruling caste and an un-upgraded underclass.

4 The Frankenstein Dilemma: The Obliteration of Sapiens

- ✓ Just as *Homo sapiens* wiped out Neanderthals tens of thousands of years ago, the post-human beings we create may view modern humans as irrelevant, primitive biological relics.
- ✓ When Mary Shelley wrote *Frankenstein* in 1818, she warned that when humans attempt to play God and create life, they inevitably lose control of their creation.
- ✓ Advanced artificial intelligence systems that rewrite their own algorithms could rapidly surpass human cognitive capacity, pursuing goals that human minds cannot comprehend or control.

5 The Ultimate Question: "What Do We Want to Want?"

- ✓ Because modern biotechnology and neuro-engineering will soon give humans the power to redesign our own desires, emotions, and thoughts, the old philosophical questions are obsolete.
- ✓ In the near future, the question is not "What do we want to become?", but rather: **"What do we want to want?"**
- ✓ Yuval Noah Harari warns that self-made gods who do not know what they want, and who are accountable to no one, are the most dangerous entities the universe has ever produced.
